Curriculum Overview - RE





KS3

The foundation of KS3 RE is for students to understand the different beliefs that people have and how this can affect the world around them. The students do this through the study of world religions, worldviews, philosophy, social sciences and ethics. Students will begin to question the importance of religion in the world today and see how it is entwined within the structure of society, and how people can practice their beliefs in these changing times. The curriculum will provoke curiosity and passion within our students which will aid them in becoming well rounded and good civilians in society. Topics studied:

Year 7: Culture and identity, Initiation, pilgrimage, marriage, death and the afterlife: all linked to the different religions: Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism and Sikhism. Finishing with Religion in today's society.

Year 8: Religion in today's world: Is religion really peaceful; Does punishment work; Animal rights.

Year 9: Religion in today's world: Is religion really peaceful; Does punishment work; Animal rights.

Students join SUA with varying levels of understanding about world religions. While many are familiar with some religious observances, such as Diwali in Hinduism and Easter in Christianity, their knowledge often lacks depth. Therefore, Year 7 focuses on broadening this foundation by exploring a diverse range of ceremonies across different faiths. This approach ensures all students develop a more comprehensive understanding of world religions before engaging with more complex religious concepts and theories in Years 8 and 9.

Experiences

Students will have the opportunity to engage in discussions about tolerance and diverse religious beliefs through partnerships with external organizations. One example of this is the "Give Racism the Red Card" workshop.
